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I, Alyse Eytan, M.D., have personal knowledge of the facts stated in this declaration and, if called as a witness, I could and would testify competently thereto under oath. I declare as follows:

- I am a Developmental Psychiatrist in Chicago, Illinois, currently operating a private practice. I am also affiliated with Northwestern University in Chicago.
- 2. I am Board Certified in Child and Adolescent, Adult, and Geriatric Psychiatry. I also am involved with different infant mental health organizations.
  - 3. A copy of my career summary is attached to this declaration.
- 4. Although I have not physically examined Theresa Marie Schiavo, I have familiarized myself with her case and situation. I have also seen her on videotapes from the news and I have read articles about her condition.
- 5. It is a matter of credibility whether Ms. Schiavo wants to live or die. An "off the cuff" remark made to another person is not a "state of mind." Our selves are in a constant state of change, a process determined by our own genes, environment and life events, as well as the wish to change. Because we are all in the process of changing, Ms. Schiavo is not the same person as she was when she made her alleged remarks about not wanting to live in a certain condition.
- 6. Ms. Schiavo is not on a respirator. She is merely using a feeding tube. She is not suffering, or disfigured by it, nor does she experience physical complications from relying on it. Removing it will lead to her death and terminate all chance of her improving or enjoying any future life. Healthy people aren't often able to appreciate how severely injured people can cling to life.
- 7. From what I've read and seen on television it appears that Ms. Schiavo responds to certain stimuli. Even if these responses are random at times, I believe that more advanced interventions with multi-sensory stimulation for a lengthy period of time would be beneficial.
