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DECLARATION OF KYLE LAKAS, M.S. C.C.C, S.L.P.

- I am a Speech Language Pathologist (S.L.P), and I currently work in hospitals and nursing homes in Abilene, Texas, assisting adults; mainly stroke victims. I spend a large amount of time providing swallowing therapy and treatment.
- 2. I have a Masters in Science (M.S.), and I also have a Certificate of Clinical Competence (CCC).
- 3. I have not physically examined Terri Schiavo, however I base my opinions on my unique knowledge and experience working with patients in a similar condition, as well as my limited knowledge regarding Ms. Schiavo's actual condition. I have experience working with another patient in the same condition as Ms. Schiavo, however her therapy began immediately.
- 4. It is my opinion that a patient can never have too much therapy, at any stage. Without giving Ms. Schiavo therapy, she does not have a chance to improve. She deserves at least six months of five day a week therapy to see if she can progress at all. The changes in a patient during this time period may be slight, and therefore extensive documentation is required. However, even a slight change in condition is a great improvement. After aggressive therapy a decision can be made regarding the appropriate treatment for Ms. Schiavo.
 - 5. I believe Ms. Schiavo needs both a speech assessment and a swallowing assessment.
- 6. There is a relatively new swallowing therapy called VitalStim. It is an electro-therapy used to re-strengthen the throat muscles. It trains the throat muscles to function again, by using small electrical currents to stimulate the muscles responsible for swallowing. The success rate for VitalStim has been huge. This therapy was approved by the FDA in 1997, however, it has only been widely publicized and recognized as very successful treatment within the past several

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
